2025 Recertification Requirements are 20 hours Volunteer & 10 hours Continuing Education

We recommend entering your hours into VMS if not the same day as the task, then at least weekly! **But** worst case, <u>Please log all of your hours by or before the last day of the month</u> in order for them to be counted properly.

Monthly reporting by volunteers is paramount as it serves as the fundamental tool for collection of volunteer service. Agents report monthly to the state and quarterly to the federal government. Hours that go <u>unreported in the timeline</u> they were served <u>hold significant implications</u>, particularly in the context of <u>funding</u>. Accurate reporting of hours served is essential for the program to demonstrate its activities and contributions, which directly correlate to the allocation of funds. <u>Any hours that are not properly accounted for in the correct period may lead to the loss of financial support</u>, as they cannot be included in reports. Accurate and timely reporting ensures a comprehensive overview of the efforts of volunteers, safeguarding its ability to continue serving the people of Texas.



Monthly Meeting



In Memory Of

HELGA JOHANNA ROTH LANGE

July 21, 1937 – July 5, 2025



One of our former GCMGs, Helga Johanna Roth Lange, affectionately known as Johanna, passed away peacefully on July 5, 2025, at the age of 87. Johanna was born on July 21, 1937, in Winters, TX.

Johanna graduated from Seguin High School in 1956 and later earned her Bachelor of Science degree from Texas Lutheran College. She went on to enjoy a fulfilling 22-year career at Seguin High School, where she taught physical science, biology, typing, and bookkeeping, touching the lives of countless students along the way.

A charter member of Faith Lutheran Church, Johanna faithfully stood by her husband's side in ministry for 45 years as a dedicated pastor's wife. She was especially beloved for her "Sand

Box Stories" during Vacation Bible School and Sunday School—an interactive story-telling method she learned from her mother, Elner. Many children, long into adulthood, fondly remembered how Johanna brought Bible stories to life using a simple sandbox. She joyfully passed this tradition on to others, ensuring it would be shared with future generations.

Among her proudest accomplishments was the restoration of one of her grandfather's old country churches, which had been converted into a sheep shed. With the stained-glass windows still intact, Johanna purchased the structure and had it relocated to the Texas Agricultural Education and Heritage Center (behind the Big Red Barn). Now known as Zion Church, it continues to serve as a sacred space for weddings, baptisms, and worship services

Johanna was known for many passions, including her famous homemade dill pickles, which she often taught others how to make. She found joy in gardening and in restoring antique trunks, often turning heirloom pieces into beautiful keepsakes. She had a deep love for history and often said she believed she had lived on the Oregon Trail in a past life—so much so that she once displayed an old wagon in her front yard before donating it to The Big Red Barn.

Ask the Master Gardeners

Q: I planted a crape myrtle near my front door and am now afraid it is going to be too much work to keep it off of my house and roof. What do I do now?

A: You will either have to move it, or resign yourself to the fact that it will need to be trimmed. Crape myrtles come in different sizes: miniature (2 to 3 feet); dwarf (3 to 6 feet); semi-dwarf (5 to 12 feet); small tree (10 to 20 feet); and tree (over 20 feet). I made this same mistake twenty years ago when I moved into my present house. I planted a crape myrtle according to its color (a Red Rocket) without looking at how high it was supposed to get. I did move it successfully and it is still alive in the back yard, about 30 feet high, and blooming.

If you want more crape myrtles, they can be easily propagated from dormant cuttings, according to Doug Welsh in his Texas Garden Almanac. Take your cuttings in the winter from the top branches. These should be brownish in color, not new growth, and be the diameter and length of a pencil. Cut the bottom of the cutting at an angle, dip it in rooting compound, and place in good potting soil.

Q: Should I be doing something to my rose bushes?

A: Later on in August trim your bushes back by about 25 percent. Remove all the old blooms and any diseased rose leaves. Welsh then suggests fertilizing with a straight-nitrogen product. Be sure to water. This should generate new growth and your roses should bloom until the first heavy freeze.

Q: My tomato plants look awful. What now?

A: It is probably a good idea to just plant new ones. However, I asked at my local nursery and they said plants wouldn't be available until mid to late August. My Ruby Crush still has fruit but no blooms. As soon as the fruit ripens, I will cut back the plant. Then with water and fertilizer, we will see what happens.

You might want to try growing pumpkins. Several of my friends did so this past year. Other fall vegetables can also be planted. Warm season vegetables should be limited to those you buy as transplants, such as eggplant, pepper, squash and tomato. One of our local nurseries has containers of seeds labeled as cold or warm season to make it easier on you. Remember that planting this time of year requires water and perhaps shade when the sun is the hottest.

Your pears and apples will probably be ready to harvest in a few weeks. My Kieffer pear is loaded this year. Aggie-horticulture says this old standard is poor to fair for dessert use but good for canning and baking. (Some years, however, the fruit is sweet enough to eat like apples). The tree is highly resistant to fire blight.

What To Plant In August

Bush Beans, Pole Beans, Cucumber, Eggplant, Okra, Irish Potato, Summer Squash, Green Beans, and Onions.

How To Hand Pollinate Plants

Signs hand pollination is good for your plants:

- `No bees or other insects hovering around your plants.
- `Growing plants indoors, inside a greenhouse or inside a screened porch.
- `Fruit on your plants shrivel and die before maturing.
- Using row covers on plants during their blossoming time.
- `Prevent cross pollination between similar plants, when you plant to save seeds from your garden.
- Increase successful pollination and increase your harvest.

Self pollinating plants such as tomatoes or peppers pollinates by itself. It has all the sexual parts it needs to make more fruit. Each blossom is equipped to become a fruit once it is self-pollinated by wind or a visit from a pollinator.

Cross pollinated plants need to be pollinated from another plant or variety. Apple trees need a second apple tree to pollinate from.

Other plants have both male and female flowers on one plant. Many vining crops like zucchini and melons have both male and female flowers. Pollen located on the male flower's stamen needs to be transferred to the female flower, it will have a bulb shape at the bottom of the blossom rather than just a lone stem.

Plants that might need hand pollination such as eggplant, tomato, pepper, cucumber, beans, peas, strawberries, melons, zucchini, all winter squash varieties and pumpkins.

Supplies needed for hand pollination are a small paintbrush or cotton tip swabs and rubbing alcohol. Rubbing alcohol is only needed if you pollinate different varieties of plants. Example: After pollinating a zucchini plant with a paintbrush, thoroughly clean your brush before moving to another squash variety.



Self Pollinating Plants:

Make sure pollen gets down to the middle part of the flower. Gently use your brush and place it inside each flower on the plant.

Cross Pollination Plants:

Hand pollinate in the morning as blooms are more open at this time. Find the male flower, they have long stem at the base of the blossoms rather than bulbs. Put your brush inside the flower, remove some pollen from the stamen which is in the middle of the blossom. Take the pollen on your brush and transfer it to the pistil in the middle of the female flower.



The National Butterfly Center is a beautiful gem hidden in Mission TX, in the outlying area of McAllen. Located down a long desolate road that looks as if it goes nowhere, a GPS is definitely a must to find this area, but it is worth the time to find it.

The journey begins inside of the educational area that provides more information about butterflies and birds, as well as other animals that live in that area. There is information about their habitat and purpose, as well as their current struggles due to climate changes and land development. This area also contains a gift shop and restrooms.

Unfortunately, my visit there was not planned, I just happened to be in the area with extra time on my

hands. It was not butterfly "season" yet and the plants were just starting to recuperate from their winter slumber. However, the birds were magnificent.

Once you get through the educational building and past the butterfly garden area, there is a long path of trees and wooded area that is home to some of the most interesting and beautiful birds that I have ever seen in their natural habitat. Due to the Avarian Flu that was a big issue at that time, the park was not able to put out birdfeeders, however, the birds were still out and

about, making themselves known as they called from tree to tree.

The park is private and charges \$10 for adults. All of the funds are used to keep the research and protection of these fabulous creatures going. The yearly membership is only \$35 and I would have one if I lived closer to this area.
