Taking pictures one likes in and around one's garden will be the focus of Guadalupe County Master Gardeners Lunch and Learn program Wednesday, October 5, 2017 at the AgriLife Building in Seguin.

To prepare the presentation, Bob Cox is asking those who may attend the session to pose questions to him about photography in garden settings that he might discuss during the event.

For example, one topic Cox will discuss is the importance of getting “stable” images. “Soft” or out of focus images might work well if enlargements are not going to be made, but any increase in image size also magnifies any error in sharpness. Examples will be used to illustrate subject matter.

Attaching a representative example of one's question is recommended. The deadline for submitting your questions is Friday, September 22, 2017.

There are ribbons to be won and bragging rights to be had on October 12, 13, 14, and 15, 2017. Entries can be brought in on Wednesday, Oct. 11th from 4-8 pm, and early on Thursday morning, Oct. 12th, from 8-8:50 am, just before the judging at the Seguin Coliseum on South Austin Street. The judging begins promptly at 9:00 am on Thursday, Oct. 12th.

What can you enter? Whatever you've grown here in Guadalupe County. Anyone can enter and there is a separate youth division for 17 years old and younger. In addition to field crops, garden crops, and orchard crops, you can also enter home products. Do you make your own butter, cheese, yogurt, or other dairy product? Do you cure your own meats, dehydrate your vegetables, collect your own honey, molasses, or eggs? Even home brewers are welcome to enter the horticulture division with their beer, wine, or mead. So start thinking about what you want to enter, there's no limit - enter as many things as you like, and it's FREE to enter!

Start planning now! The Guadalupe Master Gardeners have a wonderful booth inside the Coliseum where the air conditioning is cool and the people are friendly. Bring the family and make a day of it. At our booth you'll find displays, crafts for the kids, free seeds, raffle prizes to win and, of course, all the horticultural entries to see and admire.

- ◆ Red caps from milk (such as Oak Farms or Walmart brand) must be washed clean. These caps must be the screw on type.


Toilet paper rolls and red caps can be dropped off with Carol Calentine or left at the MG office. Tin cans be left at the storage shed in the tub.

Class 30 Update

Master Gardener Class 30 is now in session. The information and knowledge presented has been phenomenal. Everyone has been very helpful. Our class coordinators, Kay McElveen and Karen Ulrich are great and ensure we are taken of.

Dennis Hale (Landscape Designer) taught the class how to take a soil sample and discussed various landscape designs. We learned that first, you should have a design plan. He gave us practical information, such as matching your landscape to the style of your home (Tuscan, English, Tropical, etc.). October is the best time to plant. Make sure to let the soil breathe and design your landscape to fit you. Be aware of what your landscape looks like from the outside looking in and from the inside of your house, looking out. Have outdoor lighting, appropriate plants, materials, patios, walkways, borders, and focal points. We design or replace items in our homes for aging in place and ADA (Americans with Disabilities) compliance; why not extend this idea to our landscape.

Liz Palfini (Botany Instructor and Superintendent Palmetto State Park) discussed how plants grow. She provided an intro to Botany, which included various fruit types. We learned about plant kingdoms, growing seasons, various leaf types, and nitrogen fixing our soil with plants like legumes and red clover. She explained plant propagation, seed collecting and storing. After teaching about plant life processes and light, she answered our questions. Full spectrum LED grow lights are best and the best way to water plants; water more often (morning and afternoon) instead of overwatering at one time. This was my "AHA" moment, as I was guilty of this. Sorry plants.....thanks to my classes, now I know.

During my visit to Portland, OR for the IMGC in July, I visited the International Rose Test Garden. This was not my first rose garden but it was by far the largest and most intensely designed and planted. Roses of all color, shapes and sizes, including buds one color and blooms another, swirled colors like a candy cane and panoramic views of Portland from the sloping hills of the gardens.

This is part of Washington Park which also has Hoyt Arboretum, Children's Museum, Oregon Zoo, Work Forestry Center and Portland Japanese Garden. The Rose Garden began in the early 1900's and served as a safe haven for rose plants from Europe during WWI. It has a very interesting history which is too long for my article. Instead I am leaving you with a few pictures of the amazing views and roses (they say they have 10,200 rose plants). If you are a person who loves roses or are someone who just wants to be amazed by the color and smell of these roses, this is definitely a place which should be on your bucket list!

If you fall into this category, now is the perfect time to start thinking about how you will fulfill your Continuing Education Requirement.

Board Officer positions open to nomination, and a brief overview of duties, are listed below. More detailed information about each position is available in the Policies and Procedures manual in VMS, under Newsletters/Documents, Membership Information.

President Elect: succeeds to the presidency upon the expiration of the President's term; provides leadership to the Board of Directors; along with the President, assists in setting goals and expectations for the Board; serves as an ex-officio member with voting rights of all committees except the Nominating Committee; coordinates monthly reconciliation of bank accounts with Treasurer. The current President Elect is Kay McElveen.

Vice President: acts in place of President when required; Chairman of the Program Committee, which organizes educational programs for GCMG regular membership meetings; assists the President and President-Elect in their duties. The current VP is Cynthia Winkelman. We have one nominee, Marvin "T" Taylor.

Treasurer: acts as Chief Financial Officer of the Corporation and Chairman of the Budget and Finance Committee; receives all dues and monies for the Corporation and keeps an exact accounting; pays all bills on receipt of a written statement at Treasurer's discretion; provides a monthly financial report to the Board of Directors and to the general membership; prepares all required reports and payments for various state and federal agencies on a timely basis but always prior to the deadline. The current Treasurer is Kat Taylor. We have one nominee, George Ulrich

Secretary: records the minutes of all board meetings, general membership meetings and any special meetings that may be called; provides a preliminary copy of the Board Meeting minutes to the Board of Directors for their review and correction; provides a copy of the Membership Meeting minutes to the Board of Directors for final approval before minutes are presented to membership; Chairman of the Nominating Committee; sends appropriate cards to members identified as being in need. Current Secretary is Janice Jadwin; she is term-limited and cannot serve as Secretary next year..


