





Membership Corner Class 37 Update

Class 37 is two-thirds complete, and interns have been getting into the fine details of successful gardening. We have had the help of many fabulous instructors who have continued to inspire us. Our mentors and class coordinators Tim Steele and Paul Carter continue to support each of us as we complete our tests and record volunteer hours. Congratulations to Wendy Salazar who is the first intern to complete her 50 volunteer hours.

Soil was the topic of our March 21 class, with instructor Tony Provin. His presentation on Soil Characteristics and Improvements was full of valuable information. We all know how important our soil is to all those seeds we plant. Our first topic was the science of soils. This discussion provided information on soil components, texture, structure, and chemical characteristics. Soil management was next, and this included looking at soil maps which was something many of us had never seen. Most importantly, we learned about soil fertility and how to improve it. Tony expressed the importance of soil testing. Many interns shared their reports with him during breaks, getting a better understanding of amendments that can be made to their own soil.

Dennis Hale returned for our March 28 class. His first topic was a discussion of incorporating ornamentals into our landscapes. Ornamental trees and grasses were shown with details on best growing conditions, and what to expect in mature plants. Dennis also talked about Turf Grass. We had an in-depth discussion on what to plant, where to plant it, and how to maintain it. We can now take the information we received in our soil sample reports and put what we've learned into practice.

Mark Fanick began our April 11 class with a presentation on Fruit Trees. We learned about nutrients and proper planting techniques. We saw many examples of varieties that flourish in our climate. He talked about common pests and how to treat them. April Rippel followed with her presentation on Herbs. We were told about the various varieties of herbs, how they differ from spices, and their many different uses. It was a very enlightening discussion learning that herbs are used not only for seasoning our favorite recipes, but are utilized for their medicinal benefits, used in aromatherapy, and for their antimicrobial properties.

Our class on April 18 was all about ornamental trees and was presented by Nancy Masterson. Nancy took us through a detailed look at native ornamental trees that work best in our Guadalupe County landscapes. Her presentation included many beautiful trees, suited to the needs of about any environmental condition. Details about the leaves, canopy and tree structures were stressed. Following her presentation, interns were asked to identify leaf samples she brought in from various locations in Seguin. All were from trees shown during her presentation. This was great practice in tree identification, and a fun activity everyone enjoyed. She also demonstrated tool sharpening. Now, none of us have an excuse for having dull clippers.

With only a few weeks left in our journey, Class 37 is continuing to gain more knowledge and confidence with each passing class. By volunteering we are getting experience in what it means to be a Master Gardener in our community while meeting many wonderful people. We keep moving forward with our gardens, knowing the job is never done but loving every minute of the journey.





Native Plant Society of Texas Guadalupe Chapter

Plants of the Weston Ranch

The Weston Ranch lies between Marion and New Braunfels. Texas Lutheran University Faculty and students have documented over 400 species of vascular plants within the 4,000 acres of ranchland. Parts of the ranch have been heavily invaded by huisache and mesquite and a prairie restoration project began in 2019. They are measuring the effects on plant diversity caused by the clearing of the shrubs.

Mark Gustafson is a professor of biology at TLU. He is an ecologist and has been studying the biodiversity of Guadalupe County for many years. He is the author of "A Naturalist's Guide to the Texas Hill Country," published by Texas A&M Press.

Ask the Master Gardeners

Clara Mae Marcotte is a Texas Master Gardener with Texas A&M AgriLife Extension. If you have a question to be answered, call the Master Gardeners at 830-379-1972 or leave a message to be answered. The website is guadalupecountymastergardeners.org. The Master Gardener research library is open Wednesdays from 1:00 p.m. until 4:00 p.m., and is located at 210 East Live Oak Street in Seguin.

Q: When is it time to change out my cool season annuals?

A: Pretty much any time now. I notice that the flowering cabbage at the library is starting to lose leaves, and the snapdragons are about bloomed out. I cut them back but as soon as we get our usual heat, they won't be happy. Warm season annuals are marigold, penta, periwinkle, portulaca, purslane, salvia, and scaevola.

My favorite of these is the periwinkle (vinca) because it does so well in those big pots.

Q: How can I protect my vegetable plants? I just picked my first tomato and there was a hole on the bottom where something has been eating.

A: If you are protecting fruits and vegetables from squirrels and birds, you can use plastic netting. Cover the plant to the ground and put soil over the bottom ends. Make sure you overlap the netting, because if there is a way to get to the fruit, squirrels and birds can find it.

Other damage can be caused by pill bugs, snails and slugs. You can control them by using slug and snail baits. Doug Welsh, Extension Horticulturist, says that some success has been achieved using saucers of beer and two-inch-wide bands of calcite clay (kitty litter).

Stinkbugs and leaf-footed bugs can also be a problem. Malcolm Beck used to say that the best deterrent was your shadow. In other words, check your plants daily and hand pick the bugs off before they go too long and get out of hand. I have had good luck grabbing these bugs and throwing them in a bucket of soapy water. Another friend smashes them with a brick.

If you must use pesticide, Welsh warns us to use the least toxic, effective pesticide labeled for the job. Notice that he mentions the label. Read the label carefully and talk to your local nursery person particularly if you are using it on vegetables. Also, remember to wear gloves, don't spray while the wind is blowing, and wear a mask. Take into account that there are many good bugs out there. To protect bees, spray in the late evening or early morning. Other good bugs include lady bugs and lacewings whose larvae eat aphids. Praying mantids eat young grasshoppers. Parasitic wasps lay their eggs in aphids and army worm caterpillars. Then when the larvae hatch, they eat the insect.

The simple answer to the bug and animal problem is to plant more than you need. Then if the problem gets ahead of you, you still have enough fruit and vegetables for your family, as well as for the local wildlife.

Q: What can I plant in the shade and partial shade?

A: Several of the sages will do well: cedar sage, lyre leaf sage, and mountain sage. Inland sea oats is a favorite landscape plant as is red and yellow columbine. Turks Cap grows well; just don't let it get away from you. Beautyberry, a wonderful shrub, is another good choice.

Cucumbers, Eggplant, Peppers, Okra, Squash, and Corn.

Native Texas Plants For Shade

- -Turks Cap- Plant in shady corner by fence or under a tree.
- -American Beautyberry- Plant under a tree as it can spread or near a birdbath.
- -Rock Rose- Plant in part shade or dappled shade.

Native Texas Plants For Full Sun

- -Esperanza-Can get up to 6' tall. Great for Xeriscape area.
- -Cenizo (Texas Sage)- Official State Native Shrub of Texas. Create a blooming hedge with Texas Sage.
- -Gregg's Mistflower- Plant in container garden or wildflower meadow. Attracts butterflies.
- -Flame Acanthus- Plant in sunny spot in perennial flower garden, Xeriscape or container pot.
- -Mealy Blue Sage-. Plant in landscape bed or large container pot.

Texas Native Plants For Ground Covers

- -Frogfruit-. Loved by pollinators. Plant in bare patch of lawn or between stepping stones.
- -Wooly Stemodia-. Mix with other native plants in a container pot.

Texas Native Plants For Fall

- -Fall Aster-. Plant with other perennials or in front of flower bed.
- -Inland Sea Oats-. Provide winter food for birds. Plant in shady corner, an area with poor drainage, or along fence or sidewalk.

Marilyn Moltz The Road Less Traveled:


Idaho

On our trip last fall, we were traveling from Twin Falls, ID to White Dove, ID and decided to take the scenic route since we had plenty of time to arrive at our next destination.
