Gardening Starts With Skill

The Guadalupe County Master Gardener Class 38 is the place to get "real deal" skills to master gardening. From the coordinators' generous spirits to the speakers' plethora of knowledge and experience one cannot undermine its goodness for its students, Texas, and the Earth.

To master anything requires one to "execute with skill" any task. So far, I have been given information to skillfully execute many forms of gardening in exchange for willingly sharing this knowledge with others. Truly, "Wisdom is the principal thing; therefore get wisdom: and with all thy getting get understanding" (Proverbs 4:7). Wisdom to get these skills is given in a hard back book on agriculture, while the understanding is obtained through written tests, professional speakers' lessons, and hands-on examples.

The first class led by Dennis Hale inspired me to confidently take on practical or elaborate landscaping despite our drought-stricken state! He taught the importance of understanding soil quality, physically showed how to collect and send samples to TAMU laboratories, as well as how to get information back for later use, all while giving nuggets on why and when to fertilize this same soil. He further showed that planning landscape designs require consideration of things like size, light, water, climate, and terrain.

In natural order, the earth-kind class, taught by Peter Hernandez, urged landscaping or gardening with the earth in mind. Do not put out desirable plants that won't do well in this environment until first considering what already grows here. Planting what is suitable or naturally adapted to this region is best and Texans call 'em "Texas Superstars" (see aggie-horticulture.tamu.edu/Earthkind for a full list). Hernandez also made us reflect on water conservation and the dangers of wasteful irrigation. We were asked to try preserving rain water in barrels or a "rain garden," which is simply placing ideal plants in low areas that hold water. On the other hand, it was expressed that some conservation could be done by just checking sprinklers for side walk runoffs or draining holes in your drip line, which in both cases could place a drain in your wallet.

Next in line is our soil class by Dr. Tony Provin. Why? Because having a watering system doesn't guarantee that your plants will absorb water. We were taught that good soil is vital for root water absorption, so it must be at optimal texture, alkalinity, and elemental balance. Although vastly complex, yet infinitesimally simple it was stated that our soil is constantly stripped by erosion. So, the task was clear: find out what my soil lacks and do the best to return it to its most favorable condition. I also learned that **dirt** is a dirty word symbolizing undesirable materials! Rather respect the earth by calling it **soil** which means naturally occurring materials that anchor plants, stores water, and infinite nutrients!

Furthermore, if you weren't paying attention in biology class a reminder was brought back by another instructor, Mark Gustafson. He shared that plants have advanced living cells that store food for new life. They can also harden as the plant ages. These living cells differentiate when to make a root or a shoot and when to feed plants sugars to grow. All of this while storing energy for later and transporting water from the soil, which in some plants that's hundreds of feet in the air! Now that's awesome biology, or specific to the study of plants, "botany!"

Speaking of awesome, the hands-on propagation class was exciting and fast! We were taught several methods to clone a plant or to start it from seed, but nothing compared to getting hands-on experience. The instructors were patient and kind, while gently guiding us on what to cut or divide and what not to, plus the importance of cleaning up afterwards! From the Red Barn, I took as many cuttings as my hands could carry eager to see what happens when planted. I hope for more field trips like this one!

Finally, the arborist, Christy Rohlf, was ever so kind in giving us the essence and spirit of trees and how important they are. I was fascinated to learn the errors of improperly pruning trees and am now cognizant of the beauty and health I see in those done properly. With this in mind, I am eager to practice proper tree pruning in my own yard this winter!

To close, I am no master of one thing but this class sure gives me steps on how to become a skillful gardener. With its wisdom I am able to confidently execute landscape designs, plant propagation, pruning of ornamental trees, and much more. The tools have been placed in my mind and hands to go and grow! I give sincere thanks to the Master Gardener creators and those who enthusiastically continue its purpose. I look forward to many more classes to come!

Ask the Master Gardeners.

The website is guadalupecountymastergardeners.org. The Master Gardener research library is open Wednesdays from 1:00 p.m. until 4:00 p.m., and is located at 210 East Live Oak Street in Seguin.

Q: I live in Seguin where there are some empty raised planter beds on several street corners. What kind of small tree could be planted there?

A: I like the small variety of Crape myrtle that is planted on the west corner of Donegan and S. Austin; however, Crape myrtle is not native. www.Wildflower.org, as well as a CPS Energy site for San Antonio trees, suggests small native trees such as cherry laurel, Mexican plum, and Texas redbud.

Mexican plum (Prunus Mexicana) and Texas redbud (Cercis Canadensis var. texensis) are both lovely trees and both have blooms. Mexican plum grows to 25 feet with a 25 foot spread, while Texas redbud grows to 10-20 feet with a 12-20 foot spread. I have one of each. However, both are deciduous which would leave a bare trunk in the winter.

Cherry laurel (Prunus caroliniana) is an evergreen which can grow to 40 feet with a 35 foot spread which sounds a little large. However, if you go to our library parking lot, you will note a border of small shrubs. These are cherry laurels which have been there several years and are still small. They also bloom and would probably do quite well although would have to be trimmed as a tree instead of a shrub. The only problem I can see is whether or not they would block the line of sight of a driver turning the corner although that is a problem no matter what you plant.

Q: Are there shrubs available with berries that are suitable for our Texas landscapes?

A: We have many shrubs that will do well here. One of my favorites is the American beautyberry. Of course the berries don't stay on long because they are also favorites of birds, butterflies and deer. American holly and Nellie R. Stevens holly both have red fruit (and are usually my table decorations at Christmas). Possumhaw holly is a small tree with red berries in the winter. It is very decorative when the leaves fall off, leaving the berries behind.

Q: We've had such a dry year. Will we have any native fall bloomers?

A: As I look out my back door, I see buds atop my goldenrod (Solidago Altissima). They have a yellow tint and will be opening soon. Many people don't care for goldenrod, but I love it. This perennial is a favorite nectar source of bees and butterflies, and can be used as a dye plant. www.wildflower.org says the height of the plant is determined by the fertility and moisture content of the soil. My patch of goldenrod managed to stay alive all summer in spite of the fact that I don't water the back half of my lawn.

Another fall bloomer is frostweed (Verbesina virginica). As I write this, some of my frostweed is starting to set buds in spite of the lack of rain.

FYI: Don't forget to keep your birdbaths topped up. I noticed honeybees drinking from my lily pond yesterday, and all three birdbaths were empty this morning.

What To Plant In October:

New trees and shrubs. Sow wildflower seeds. Plant cauliflower, soft neck garlic, thyme, oregano, lavender, parsley, dill, fennel, borage, summer savory, greens and lettuce.

Scary Plants From Around The World:

Gympie-Gympie- Eastern Australia and Indonesia

Stinging hairs cover the shrub and delivers a potent neurotoxin when touched it causes an extremely painful stinging sensation that can last for days, weeks, or months. Small red spots join together to form a welt. It is said to be agonizing.

Manchineel Tree

Flowering plant native to tropical North America and Northern South America. It resembles an Apple tree and it is called Little Apple Of Death. All parts of the tree contain strong toxins, some that still have not been identified. The tree has a milky sap and standing beneath it during rain will cause blistering of skin even from slight contact. Eye contact can cause blindness.

Remember to learn about your plants and be careful.
