



Info from April from January's class on Herbs

Thank you everyone that attended the GCMG January Monthly Membership Meeting, it was great to see all of you and to share information on how to use your herbs.

A few questions were asked at the end of the lecture, I'd like to share the answers with you as they were good questions. "Can any type of marigolds be used to make calendula oil" (recipe below). Regular pot marigolds should be used (Calendula officinalis). Some of the marigolds, like French Marigolds, won't have the vitamins, antioxidants, & medicinal properties found in plain ole pot marigolds.

Another question was asked about the names of teas that you can find at most any grocery store and what they are historically good for. Apologies that the slide was a bit off and didn't show the first few letters of the tea name. Below is the list of teas.

To Make Calendula Oil:

Pack a clean, glass jar with fresh or dried calendula petals (if using fresh, let them sit uncovered for 12 hours to remove moisture). Pour oil over the petals, making sure they are covered by 1 inch. Stir or shake well. Cap tightly, label & date. Keep in a sunny spot & shake once a day for 4-6 weeks. Strain the oil, discarding the petals and re-bottle the oil. Calendula oil made from calendula officinalis has antiseptic, anti-fungal, and anti-inflammatory properties. (Herbs That Clean and Calm).

If using for culinary purposes use any of your favorite oils that you normally use in your recipes. Olive oil and avocado oils are excellent choices.

If you are using your calendula oil for medicinal purposes or to make your own beauty products, good oil choices are grapeseed oil, jojoba oil, sweet almond oil, rosehip seed oil, argan oil, and safflower oil. Empty the contents of one Vitamin E capsule into the oil to serve as a preservative. Use within one year. According to the Chestnut School of Herbs, Calendula Oil can be used externally for rashes, sunburn, swelling, eczema, acne, stings, wounds, burns, scrapes, chicken pox, cold sores, etc.

Commonly found teas and their historical uses:

Green tea – thought to fend off inflammation and certain chronic diseases

<u>Black tea</u> – One study found that regularly drinking black tea was associated with a lower risk of developing a neurocognitive disorder, such as dementia in the elderly, particularly for elderly women

Oolong Tea – May contribute to healthier cholesterol levels

Chamomile – May aid sleep and support immunity

Ginger tea – May help treat nausea and vomiting

Peppermint tea – Associated with a healthy digestive system

<u>Hibiscus tea</u> – Thought to lower blood pressure, cholesterol, blood sugar, body fat, and helps with iron deficiencies

<u>Fennel Tea</u> – Thought to help relax digestive muscles to help with bowel regularity, & IBS. Also, may help ease menopause symptoms

<u>Moringa</u> – Antioxidant-rich, believed to have a unique ability to reduce inflammation, speed healing, aid in digestion, enhance energy levels, and assist in weight loss. It is being studied for relief of arthritis, gout, stomach upset, diarrhea, nausea, & the common cold

Herb Salad Dressing:

3/4 cup Olive Oil

¼ cup Apple Cider Vinegar

½ tsp. salt (optional)

Freshly ground Black Pepper to taste

14 tsp Dry Mustard

1 Tbsp. Tarragon (fresh or dried)

1 Tbsp. Dill (fresh or dried)

1 Tbsp. Basil (fresh or dried)

Add all ingredients together, mixing well. Let stand in the fridge at least 3 days for the flavors to meld.

Yield: 1 Cup, use on salads or as a marinade

Different Herbs for making pesto:

Cilantro Jalapeno Pesto – almonds, cilantro, jalapeno, garlic, salt & pepper to taste, extra virgin olive oil.

Parsley Pesto – parsley leaves, basil leaves, extra virgin olive oil, dry roasted & unsalted pistachios, parmesan cheese, salt & pepper to taste.

Mint Pesto – mint leaves, parmesan cheese, extra virgin olive oil, pine nuts, fresh garlic cloves, salt & pepper to taste.

Basil Pesto – roasted pine nuts, fresh lemon juice, garlic cloves, basil leaves, extra virgin olive oil, parmesan cheese, salt & pepper to taste.

Experiment with the measurements, make small batches, vary the ingredients, variety is the spice of life! If you've never made a pesto, find a basic recipe, and then use the above ingredients. Have fun!

Chai tea for good health:

- 1 cup water
- 2 thin slices of fresh ginger (unpeeled)
- 2 cardamon pods
- ½ stick of cinnamon
- 3 black peppercorns
- 2 whole cloves

Place all in a small pan & simmer for 10 minutes. Strain into a cup, add a tea bag (green tea)

& let steep for a few minutes until cool enough to sip. Add honey to taste & frothed milk (traditional) if desired.

Energy Boost Power Paste:

1 cup Honey

½ cup organic black strap molasses

3 Tbsp. each of dried – astragalus & American ginseng

1 tsp. of cinnamon

½ tsp. each of dried – ground cardamom and powdered ginger

Mix all ingredients well, if paste is too thick add a bit of concentrated fruit juice (like cranberry or black cherry). Store in refrigerator indefinitely.

Use spread on toast, add to oatmeal, put in tea, or just lick from the spoon.

Herbal Smoothie

Make tea with fresh or dried herbs; use a single herb tea or your favorite tea blend. Burdock, chamomile, elder flower, ginger, lemon balm, lemon verbena, mint, oatstaw, orange peel, rose hips, moringa, etc.

Strain the herbs from the tea.

Put the tea in a blender.

Add fresh or frozen fruit. Examples: Blueberries, bananas, strawberries, peaches, etc.

If using fresh fruit, add small handful of ice.

Add fresh herbs. Examples: Basil, cilantro, Calendula petals, dandelion greens, lemon balm, parsley, mint, rose petals, etc.

Add yogurt or milk of choice (optional). You can also use almond milk, soy milk, etc. Blend everything well in the blender.

Ask the Master Gardeners.

Clara Mae Marcotte is a Texas Master Gardener with Texas A&M AgriLife Extension. If you have a question to be answered, call the Master Gardeners at 830-379-1972 or leave a message to be answered. The Master Gardener research library is open Wednesdays from 2:00 p.m. until 4:00 p.m., or as needed, by scheduling, and is located at 210 East Live Oak Street in Seguin.

Q: I saw tomato plants in my garden center's greenhouse. Is it time to buy and plant them now?

A: Normally we would look at last year's final freeze date to plan for this year. The last freeze at my house last year was February 12; in 2022 it was March 13; and in 2021 it was February 22. With a spread of temperatures like that, it is hard to plan. If you garden in a small way, such as with containers, go ahead and buy your tomato plants. Put each in a one gallon pot of soil, and place the pots on your wagon or garden cart. Then you can put them in the sun during the day, and when the nights are below 50, pull them back into your garage or house. Then when it is time to plant in the ground, your tomato plants will have great root systems.

Q: May I prune my roses now? I have heard that February is the time to do that.

A: I've always been told to prune roses on Valentine's Day. It is certainly an easy way to remember. Doug Welsh, Extension Horticulturist, suggests pruning each bush to a height of 18 to 24 inches, leaving only four to six main canes, with each facing outward. The bush should look like an upside down umbrella. If you have old fashioned roses, prune about one third of the plant's height. Be sure to remove old blooms, prune off damaged, diseased, or dead leaves, twigs, or blooms, and clean up the old rose debris under the plant to help with future disease problems.

Q: When can I plant spring flowers?

A: You should probably wait for the last freeze, although many of our cool season annuals made it through January. My snapdragons at the library look dreadful as do some of the flowering kale. But the kale in the back planter look like they will make it. My snapdragons at home, however, look great as does my kale. If you don't mind planting again in a few months' time, you might go ahead and put in a few cool season annuals now, such as alyssum, calendula, dianthus, pansy, sweet pea, and violas. Then, when the heat hits, plant your vinca, zinnias, marigold, petunias and other warm-season annuals.

Q: What time of year are trees, shrubs and vines fertilized?

A: Welsh says February is a good time to fertilize them so that nutrients can be absorbed by the roots in preparation for spring growth.

Q: My bluebonnets are up all around my mailbox. Should I be doing something to them?

A: You might hand pull weeds. I put flags around mine so that no one mows or walks on the area. Also, don't fertilize. Bluebonnets manage on their own by nitrogen fixation. Bacterium form nodules on the roots of the bluebonnet and are able to convert atmospheric nitrogen to a form usable by the plant.

"The Magic of Milkweed" by Lee Marlowe

Milkweeds are amazing plants that host caterpillars of the Monarch butterfly and other species. In addition to being larval host plants, milkweeds serve an important role as nectar plants for a wide variety of insects. Individual milkweed plants are often teeming with life, serving as small, unique ecosystems within a landscape. Lee will discuss the importance of native milkweeds, share photos showing a close look at some of the many creatures interconnected with milkweed, and provide tips on how to care for milkweed in your landscape.

Lee Marlowe is a restoration ecologist with over 20 years of professional experience working in the field of ecological restoration and natural resource management including sustainable landscape practices and applications. Her expertise includes the use of native plants to provide wildlife habitat, water quality benefits and aesthetic beauty in landscapes of all sizes. She is an avid native plant gardener and currently serves as the Sustainable Landscape Ecologist for the San Antonio River Authority and President of the San Antonio Chapter of the Native Plant Society of Texas.


