



Return to your Roots (Pun intended) By Dr. Bjorn Johnson, GCMG Intern Class #39

I have always had a garden growing up. In the middle of the 1.2 million acre pine barrens, where we lived, a hardy vegetable garden was essential to help make ends meet in the lower, middle class neighborhoods that sparsely dotted the landscape. This yearly cycle of planting, tending and harvesting came to an abrupt end when I joined the Navy, moved to the other coast and lived on a steel ship. Though the 22 years in service blessed me with a beautiful, loving, brilliant, energetic, compassionate, wonderful wife (just making sure I adequately grease these skids as I want to build a stone potting and germination shed soon), happy, healthy and successful children and experiences and life lessons I can not expect to replicate; it did limit our ability to garden.

Now that I have retired from service, finally able to move back to Texas, and am in what we hope is our forever house, the time to reengage with gardening is now and it has hit me in a big way. Maybe too big! We have over a half acre of flower beds at the new house and so far 18 raised vegetable beds that I recently built, not mention the two beehives I built which house my lovely pollinating ladies. Though I live by the motto 'anything worth doing is worth overdoing' and now the motto I got from a recently forced to watch movie 'everything, everywhere, all at once,' I quickly found that my life's experience gardening in the acidic soil of the pine barrens and the gentle climate of San Diego was pretty much useless. Since my daughter is a graduate of Texas A & M, I immediately turned to the AgriLife Extensions and enrolled in the Master Gardner Class #39. What an amazingly fruitful decision this was and the classes we have had and that are ahead of us I truly believe are fundamental in providing the education, knowledge and resources to see my gardening expectations, however large, come to fruition. For instance, March 26th was a very interesting and engaging class, one from which I will take a lot of lessons.

The propagation class started with a short lecture session on the different types of propagation. This culminated in an immersive and quite excellent hands on propagation session at St. Andrews Church garden just down the block. Students were able to immediately put the information into practice and solidify, under the guidance of experienced Master Gardeners, the skills needed to begin new life from the old. With the cost of box store and nursery plants—escalating, the ability to freely grow my plant stock with a little soil and pots is fundamental to fill the vast area of landscape that we have. Donated plants from Master Gardeners' gardens were provided and students left with trays full of cuttings to root, grow and plant out in their landscapes. One of the tasks we completed was to thin out some Iris at the garden and I was given a two foot clump to take home. I was able to divide this group into 25 separate plants. Given box store and nursery prices for Iris around \$25 for a one gallon plant I now have \$625 worth of Iris sitting in pots on my driveway.

This new set of skills is also directly correlated to the Master Gardner's philosophy of sharing education with others as we can now provide not only knowledge about a plant, but a propagated starter to help motivate more people into gardening. I have been recruited now, in my copious amounts of spare time (thick with sarcasm here), to develop and plant my daughter and son's landscapes. Which actually is a great family project which brings three generations together working outside in nature.

What I see at every Master Gardener Class, and every volunteer opportunity I do, are beautifully energetic, happy, clear thinking and mobile youngsters in their 60s, 70s and 80s bouncing around the gardens, bending to plant vegetables, shoveling mulch, and weeding is an inspiration that the second half of our lives do not have to be lived in disease and pain but can be happy, healthy, engaging and mobile. And, especially in my families case, this starts with gardening.

Our health journey includes drinking the best water that we can get. Outside of finding and harvesting from a natural spring and our well water, properly filtered rain water collection meets this goal for us and our plants. I was surprised at the simplicity of the design of rain water harvesting systems. With the exception of the tank which can get expensive with size and poses the problem of locating it on your yard, the system is quite simplistic. Gutters and piping to collect water from the roof, some filters to get out leaves and twigs, a pump to get it to the tank and then a pump and filter to get it to your house is all you need. The filter system is no more than one would find in a high end home filtering system under a kitchen sink.

The other message from class, besides the quality of the water, was the quantity of water used for various things including landscaping and gardening. The presenters made a good argument about a finite resource that is slow to regenerate and we are sticking many more straws into the 'milkshake' which drains it more quickly. We, myself included, have a tendency to take for granted things that have been readily available. For us, we have come accustom to turning on the tap and there always being water available. Having spent much time in areas of the world where this is not the case and water is considered a much more valuable commodity than we label it here, the need to reduce usage and collect as much as we can is paramount to ensuring our future generations have the plentiful supply we enjoy. The demonstrations of how to accomplish this on even a small scale through rain barrels and 'wicking' gardens provided a practical, efficient and inexpensive way to increase water conservation.

Knowing that I eventually wanted to be self-sufficient and provide all the vegetables and herbs and most fruit for my wife and me, as well as my daughter and her family and son and his soon to be expanding family, I needed to extend my growing season as much as possible. Being an obsessive planner, I had already purchased a hobby greenhouse even before fully moving into our new home, having no idea how to best employ it efficiently. Also knowing that my priority was vegetable production but my wife's is having and enjoying the lush colorful land-scapes she has always dreamed of having, the MG class on April 9th assisted me with both endeavors. We learned about greenhouse types and models and when is best to use them for instance in the Texas summer they are pretty much storage but can get you through most winters ("snowmagedon" maybe not) to extend your growing season and provide more produce or ornamental plants year round.

We had a great class covering first, native plants that were born (literally) to thrive in Texas and support other plants and wildlife and second, a class on plants to attract and support pollinators. As an engineer and computer scientist I have to get some geek in here at some point so if you take the list of native plants with the list of Superstars and cross them against the list of pollinator supporting plants then cross reference them with the type of soil, sun and water we have, finally accounting for my wife's color preferences and amount of maintenance required, I get a 'holistic' list of plants to plan out our beds ensuring that the ecosystem is supporting itself as much as possible.

Finally in conclusion, and its long coming is a result of letting an academic doctor write articles, The benefits of gardening are immense. A supply of healthy food, exercise, community, clean water, water conservation, time in nature, all the ecological benefits of green things, sustainability, charity, longevity, increased later year mobility, increased later year mental acuity, and self-sufficiency all come from this one activity, and this list is not nearly exhaustive. The Master Gardener's classes, instruction, educational outreach and volunteer service directly promotes the cultivation of these benefits to the public and the students in Class 39 have big shoes to fill but a bright future ahead of them. So I must disagree with Tracy Lawrence when he sings about the 'world needs a front porch' when, in fact, it needs a garden.

Ask the Master Gardeners.

Q: When the weather gets warmer, you change out the plants in front of the library. You have snap-dragon and pansies in there now. What warm season plant will you put in?

A: I am a lazy gardener. I will plant the tried and true periwinkle since it has done so well for me in the past. However, I could plant several other warm season annuals such as coleus, marigold, portulaca, purslane, scaevola, or zinnias. Recently I added a celosia to one of the library planters. Years ago, when Jack Linden took care of the planters, he planted celosias. They reseeded themselves, and one even ended up in an adjacent flower bed.

Aggie-hort.tamu.edu has an article on celosias citing them as one of the most eye-catching annuals to grow in the garden. There are three types: plumes, crests or spikes. And all have vivid colors, including red, yellow, cream, orange, rose, deep magenta and pink. Sizes range from four to six inches high up to over three feet. I am hoping the one I put in the planter is dwarf. Aggie-hort speculates that the plant originated in Africa and India, and possibly in dry stony regions of North and South America. They have been grown in North America since the eighteenth century. The flowers are beautiful in flower arrangements.

Q: My passion flower vine doesn't look good. What could be wrong?

A: If the damage isn't caused by Gulf Fritillary larvae, there could be a number of things wrong. Wildflower.org suggests too much water, too little water, sucking insects (aphids or scale), thrips or mites, or fungal disease, or larger insects like grasshoppers, snails or slugs. If you have checked the plant for each of these, and still need a better diagnosis, take a leaf or two to your County Extension Agent.

One of the old-time gardeners (Malcolm Beck?) said that the best way to control insects in the garden was with your shadow. In other words, every morning you should check current conditions and look for problems. This way you can solve the problem before it gets too far along.

Q: Should I be killing the ladybugs I see in my garden? They don't look quite like the ladybugs I am used to.

A: The ladybeetle is basically a good predator that feeds on aphids and soft-bodied insects that could cause plant damage. However, when the multicolored Asian beetles come in the house, they can become a nuisance. This is because some of them can bite hard enough to break the skin. Also, they can secrete a strong-smelling yellowish liquid from the joints of their legs according to extension.umn.edu.

FYI: Don't forget to keep your bird baths full and be sure to plant some butterfly attracting plants such as butterfly weed, lantana, penta, salvia, and verbena.

I recently traveled to Arlington, Texas for an event and while there I had the chance to visit the Ft. Worth Botanical Garden, and I was so glad that I did. The garden was established in 1934 and is the oldest major garden in Texas. There is no shortage of beautiful plants, flowers, ponds, and gardens, as well as a beautiful and unique collection of lifelike statues created by the artist Seward Johnson.

I only had 3 hours to spend at the garden, and though that sounds like a lot of time, it definitely is not. The grounds were absolutely gorgeous and covered with endless beds of tulips and daffodils. There are roughly 15 gardens on the 120 acre property, including a 7 acre Japanese garden, water gardens, native gardens, demonstration gardens, and so many other wonderful gardens. As a bonus, there was a butterfly exhibit, in one of the conservatories, that was easy to get lost in while also seeing orchids and other beautiful rainforest plants.

I am more than sure that my visit took place at the absolute best time of the year due to the cool weather and the breathtaking array of flowers. However, any time of the year would be amazing. If you are in the Dallas/Fort Worth area and are looking for something to do, I highly recommend the Ft. Worth Botanical Garden. I am sure I will be returning one day in the future to see the things that I missed during my visit.
